FABULOUS FACULTY

We've been growing over the last few years, so we thought you would like a brief glimpse into the set of our current faculty and their areas of interest.

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OUTSTANDING BIOLOGY SENIOR AWARD STEVEN LANCE

Each year, the Department of Biological Sciences awards one graduating student with the award for outstanding senior. This year the department proudly gave this award to Steven Lance.

Steven graduated summa cum laude this June 2011 with a major in biological sciences and minors in chemistry, religious studies and community service studies. During his time at DePaul he did research in Dorothy Kozlowski's lab and published and presented numerous abstracts. Recently, he presented their research on rehabilitation following



traumatic brain injuries at the Chicago Society for Neuroscience. His presentation on neurorehabilitation was awarded best undergraduate presentation for the conference.

In addition to his work in the biology department, Steven worked for the past three years as a teaching assistant in the chemistry department. Due to his community service scholarship, Steven also volunteered at many nonprofits across the city of Chicago. For the past three years he volunteered at Howard Brown Health Center. Howard Brown is the Midwest's largest LGBT focused health care center and Steven spent the majority of his time there working in development and volunteer services.

In June, Steven moved to Los Angeles to start his two-year program with Teach for America. He will be teaching 11th grade chemistry at a charter school in East Los Angeles. Following the completion of Teach for America, Steven is looking to get a master's in public health in order to work in the field of either community or international health care.


