Sediment collected from field work in Kansas and Nebraska is then sorted and identified. The process requires time and patience to pick through piles of sediment and find fossils such as fin fragments, vertebra, and teeth belonging to several prehistoric marine species.

Two ENV Student Researchers Share Their Start In Dr. Shimada's Lab

How did you become involved with research?

Brianna Ortiz:

After going on the Lab tour last quarter, I was able to see all of the available ENV labs. When I learned about Dr. Shimada's lab, I was very interested in what he was researching as it not only is something I am passionate about but was an area I didn't know the ENV department had available. I then asked Austin about any possible availability in the lab and then contacted Dr. Shimada personally as well. After having a conversation with Dr. Shimada about my interests and how they align with the lab, I almost immediately began working on my project. I have been working in this lab for about two months now. My work focuses on Hartland Shale of the Upper Cretaceous Greenhorn Limestone in Kansas which is a locality in what used to be the Western Interior Sea Way. Most of my time in the lab consists of searching through sediment with hope to find teeth or other bone material. It is something that takes a bit of patience. Dr. Shimada is a great teacher and leader. The wonderful students who also work in the lab have taught me so much and encouraged me to grow in my own scientific career.

Austin Salvino:

I had initially taken Dr. Shimada's BIO for ENV majors back in 2021, when classes were still entirely remote. Biology and particularly paleontology were always passions of mine and taking his class was still to date one of my favorite classes in my DePaul career. He had mentioned over the course of that quarter that he conducted much of the paleontology research referenced in his lectures with DePaul lab students in the past. As soon as classes were back in person, I went to Dr. Shimada and expressed my excitement and passion for the work he was doing and soon had the privilege to join his lab, which I have been a part of for a little over a year and a half! My work focuses on the Upper Graneros shale, which is a deposit in Kansas dating back around 100 million years ago. During this time Kansas was a shallow environment of the Western Interior Seaway.


Learn from non-profits and corporate partners how they utilize data-science and plan your future career! Curiosity is always welcome.

Award Presentation Open to DePaul Community

This hybrid celebration honors those whose active Christian nonviolence—like that practiced by Fr. Daniel Berrigan, SJ, Phillip Berrigan, and Elizabeth McAlister—resists injustice, transforms conflict, fosters reconciliation, and seeks justice and peace for all. This year's awardee is Elizabeth Kanini Kimau, an activist engaged in building a culture of peace in Northern Kenya and Southern Sudan.

A founder of Horn of Africa Grassroots Peace Forum, Kimau focuses on capacity building of those directly impacted by interethnic violence to support their becoming agents of peace. A lay Christian woman working without funding or an official position, Kimau has spent many years building trust among peoples divided by ongoing violent conflict, often putting her life at risk to foster nonviolent options.
