Sense of Community Scale Directions

There are two ways of using this scale.

For one approach, all respondents can be asked to pick one *Entity* (like a school or group home) to rate and one group of members (such as residents of a group home). This would give the sample a common reference for both *Entity* as well as *Membership*. For the letters "<u>E</u>" below, you would put in the common group or setting, and for the letters "<u>M</u>", you would put in the word member(s).

On the other hand, our study used a different method that allowed each individual to select their own *Entity* and *Membership*. In other words, the respondents would indicate a self-defined "<u>E</u>" = entity (e.g. the group being referred to, or the neighborhood, school, organization) and a self-defined "<u>M</u>" = members (e.g. members or the neighbors or students within the social network). If this method is used, participants are asked to write a word that is descriptive of the organization he or she is reflecting on (e.g. school, camp, program, etc.). Next, the participant is asked to write a word or phrase that describes the people involved in the organization (e.g. members, students, campers, etc.). In the questions below, you can replace the letter "<u>E</u>" with the Entity that was selected, and the "<u>M</u>" with the Membership that was designated.

Respondents can answer whether they Strongly Disagree, Disagree, Slightly Disagree, Slightly Agree, Agree, or Strongly Agree with the questions below.

S refers to the items from Table 2.

- S1 I think this \underline{E} was a good \underline{E}
- S22 I did not leave this \underline{E} because I wanted to
- S23 For me, this \underline{E} was a good fit
- S10 M could depend on each other in this E
- S12 M could get help from other M if they needed it
- S13 $\underline{\mathbf{M}}$ were secure in sharing opinions or asking for advice
- S18 This E was important to me
- S20 I made friends in this E
- S21 I felt good helping the E and the M

The questions above are in the past tense, so if an investigator decides to use this scale for a person's current sense of community, we suggest using the slight variation of wording below that puts things in the present tense.

- S1 I think this E is a good E
- S22 I am not planning on leaving this \underline{E}
- S23 For me, this E is a good fit

- S10 \underline{M} can depend on each other in this \underline{E}
- S12 $\underline{\underline{M}}$ can get help from other $\underline{\underline{M}}$ if they need it
- S13 $\underline{\underline{M}}$ are secure in sharing opinions or asking for advice
- S18 This \underline{E} is important to me S20 I have friends in this \underline{E}
- S21 I feel good helping the \underline{E} and the \underline{M}
